## *Minister's Corner*

*-Axel H. Gehrmann*

These days it is easy to feel inundated by symbols and stories, metaphors and layers upon layers of meaning.

We call it Christmas, following the conventions of our Christian culture, whose religious vocabulary revolves around the life and death of Jesus of Nazareth. But the holidays celebrated and the customs observed this time of year include elements that both pre-date and post-date Jesus, from miraculous birth and flame to evergreen branch and flying reindeer.

These weeks surrounding the winter solstice are a regular bonanza of sacred and secular significance, stretching from most crass economic calculations to most sublime spiritual aspirations. Add to that our personal stories: childhood memories, joyful and sad, poignant thoughts of friends and family distant or departed, gratitude for gifts given and received, the excitement of today's children, and our own hopes for the future.

It seems impossible to ignore the significance of the season. But it seems equally impossible to fully grasp the multitudinous meanings every moment holds.

That's why, I believe, our simplest observances are the most crucial. The first is to take time to be still, to cease our endless activity and create a time and space so the spirit can move more freely within us, so there is room for the deeper stirrings of our psyche.

The second is to pay attention. Pay attention to the people in your life. Try to see more clearly, and hear more closely. Do, whatever you do, with care. Be kind, to others and to yourself. Be grateful.

Without these two simple observances, all our holiday activities too easily become mindless frenzy or hollow ritual. But if we remain still and attentive, a single candle can brighten our darkest days, and a simple song can lift our hearts.

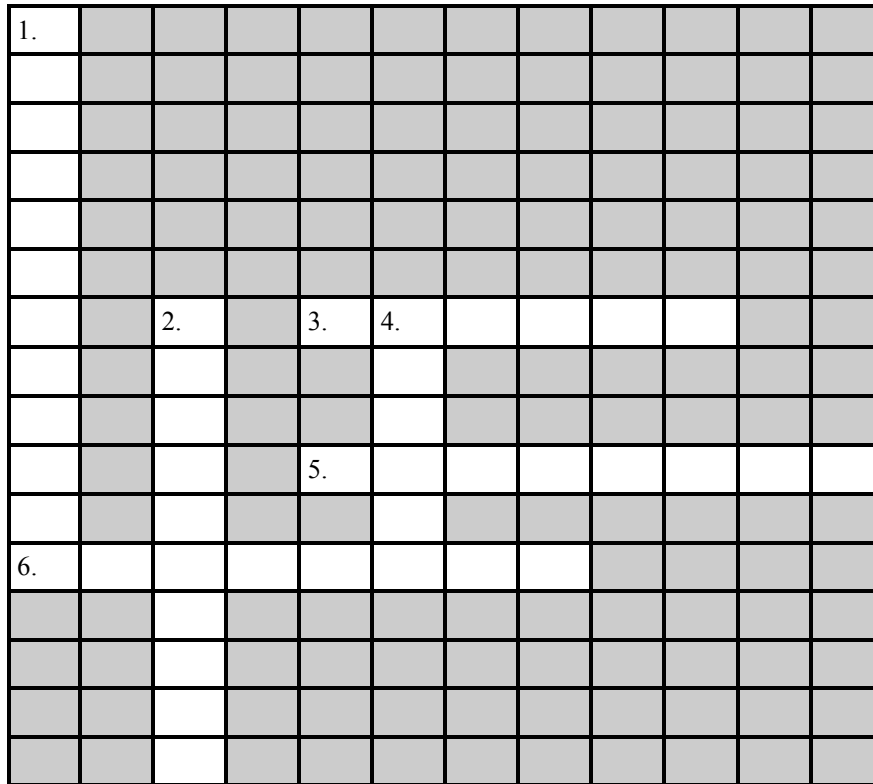

### *A new way to sign up for Sunday Crew tasks!*

We are now using VolunteerSpot, a new web service, to help us organize our weekly sign up for Sunday Crew tasks: announcing, welcoming, ushering, providing decorations and hospitality. This service is free, but there are advertisements on the page which you can hopefully ignore. We believe this is the best/easiest system for Sunday Crew sign up. You can find the VolunteerSpot link on our Church's new Web site at: <http://uucuc.org/sunday-crew>

Once you link to VolunteerSpot you will be asked to enter your email address so the system can send you a link to your personal volunteer page. Once you get that email, you can use the link in it to actually sign up for Sunday Crew. (You'll want to save that email when you get it so that you can use the link whenever you want to sign up in the future.) We have reviewed the site's privacy policy and you do not have to worry about your email address getting shared with anyone. ### **December Shared Offering: Partner Church Committee**

The December shared offering recipient is the Partner Church Committee. One of our partner churches is in Szekelykal, Romania, and one is in the Khasi Hills of northeastern India. Our mission as a partner church includes reaching across boundaries to connect with our partners, challenging ourselves to be more open to different values and behaviors, and promoting global friendships, international awareness, human rights, and a better world. Providing some financial assistance to these two village communities is a part of this mission. Funds will go toward health care and educational opportunities, giving global perspective to our social action, and strengthening the bonds of friendship between us.

### **Special Choir Presentation, December 20th Services**

On December 20, the adult choir, accompanied by organist Kent Conrad, will present Gerald Finzi's Magnificat. He composed this setting of the Canticum of Mary for the choirs of Smith and Amherst Colleges where it was first performed during a candle-lit Christmas Vespers concert in 1952. Finzi was interested in composing a non-liturgical setting of this text, hence the placement of an 'Amen' where typically a 'Gloria Patri' would have concluded the work. Composed under several time constraints, Finzi's son, Christopher recalls how his father composed the "Amen" that concludes the piece on the way to the post office, on the back of the completed score. The work captures in unique and striking fashion the joy, wonder, and depth of purpose evident both in the creative impulse of Finzi's musicianship and the record of Mary's reflections on her place in the New Testament story.

### **Walnut Tree Resurrected**

A Task Force has been formed to determine ways to utilize the wood from the walnut tree removed this past summer. Members of the task force are Tim Temple, Jean Gillespie, John Coppess, and BOT liaison Anne Sharpe. The first project is to work with a local craftsman to design and construct a walnut welcome table for our entry hall. To that end, bowls and cutting boards, crafted from the walnut wood, were sold in December. In addition, Virginia and Chet Strohecker are offering hand-made items for sale, with the proceeds also going to the table fund.

### **Help the Homeless in our Area**

Are you interested in helping the homeless in Champaign-Urbana? We would like to find a member of our church who could attend the planning/support meetings of the "Faith Coalition Supporting Safe Haven". As you may know, Safe Haven is a grass roots organization of homeless individuals who established a tent city in the backyard of the Catholic Worker Home last summer. When they were forced to move due to zoning regulations, they obtained temporary shelter at St. Mary's Catholic Church and more recently moved into space at the Restoration Urban Ministries in north Champaign (14 rooms rebuilt by members of Empty Tomb). Churches have donated funds to help with renovation costs and there are plans to develop micro housing units that additional homeless people could live in on a longer term basis.

The Faith Coalition group is an interdenominational group of many local churches. They meet weekly at **2:30pm on Tuesdays** at First Mennonite Church of Champaign-Urbana.

We don't know how our church might be able to help in this effort, but hope that a member or two of our congregation will be willing to attend some of these meetings to keep us informed. ### **Building Community Together - by David Sharpe**

*(Mission Statement, Unitarian Universalist Church of Urbana-Champaign:  
"Build community; Seek inspiration; Promote justice; Find peace")*

Why does "Build community" come first in our Mission Statement? Could it be the threshold through which we discover how to achieve the three that follow? The source of our inspiration, the strength for our efforts to promote justice and the peace that could follow, the foundation for our own sense of peace? Could it be that without a dynamic faith community, none of the rest has meaning?

How do we build community? The community that comes from the relationships between a people that make life more meaningful, richer, more joyful. More fulfilling, empowering.

Or is building community the most important thing we do? What we nourish continually? What gives us the strength to enlarge our sense of community beyond our walls so that we can promote justice and find peace? Isn't it really the work of a lifetime?

How do we find the answers? There are no blueprints. We won't find the answers in a "10 Easy Steps" book. We can't borrow them from the congregations down the street. They have found their own answers, or not. In fact, there aren't any MY answers or YOUR answers. The only real answers are the OUR answers. We will find them together. They will fit. Feel right. Work. They will be OUR's.

Each of us is the key to building and sustaining our community through our participation, our care and our financial gifts to our church. Let's continue to build our faith community for all the reasons that we need it, and need each other. Let's discover the joy together.

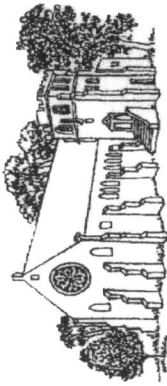
