Minister's Corner

One thing that sets a Unitarian Universalist church apart from many other religious communities, is that the task of finding relevant answers to the questions of our lives, and putting our beliefs into action, is not merely the minister's (or some other ecclesiastic authority), but is shared by every one of our members.

If you have been to church in recent weeks, you may have noticed the brightly colored 8½ by 11 sheets of paper posted on the pillars in Fellowship Hall. Each piece of paper has a quote on it, a few words written by some of you, who responded to an informal survey conducted last month, asking why you are grateful for this UU church and why you support it. These are some of the responses:

I want this church to be able to thrive and make an impact in the larger community. +++ It provides a center for my life and encourages me to reach out to others. +++ It provides a place for families to grow, for children to mature & learn to make healthy decisions. +++ I support a liberal voice for religion. +++ I believe in what we stand for & more importantly what we do. +++ We want to help this church exist for people who need it. +++ It's very important to me that my children receive an open-minded, humanist spiritual education. +++ I have found where I belong, and contributing gives me a greater sense of belonging. +++ Our UU church reminds me of my responsibility to the greater world and challenges my assumptions of what is important in my life. +++ I realize a church cannot function without support from the congregation.

The hardworking members of our Stewardship Committee have asked each of us to reflect on these questions, because the answers we provide will determine the course of our congregation as a whole. And our commitment to give generously to the annual fund drive will determine the extent to which our collective plans can be put into action.

The Stewardship Committee is encouraging each of us to step up our level of financial commitment to the church and its mission, from "Supporter" to "Sustainer" to "Visionary" and beyond. (My family and I are pledging over 5% of our family income, \$4,000, thus placing us in this year's Visionary category.)

I encourage you to keep your eyes and ears open for more information on how you can help build our religious community - and assure that it remains a place where we can join together to create a better world, beginning with ourselves.

This past Saturday a hardy and curious group of UUs gathered downstairs for a morning of exploring spiritual practices. Together we moved through three separate workshops, each on a different practice. At one workshop we learned about meditation in general and received instructions on two specific types of meditation, followed by an opportunity to meditate using both techniques we had learned. It was interesting to compare our experiences with the two methods and to hear from those who are new to the practice as well as those of you who are quite experienced.

We also learned about the history and designs of labyrinths, resources for further study, and then set out to experience what to me is their mystery. Moving a stone through a finger labyrinth, a finger through a sand labyrinth, and our bodies through a huge canvas labyrinth that graced the Children's Chapel floor were among the ways we experienced what it means to have a labyrinth be a part of your spiritual practice.

Down the hall we walked to learn about the ancient Chinese art of Tai Chi. Through slow body movements, many mimicking movements of combat and self-defense from its martial arts roots, we had the opportunity to both experience the physical benefits as well as the connection of mind and body with this practice. To me it felt so good to join in with these graceful and controlled movements as we connected not only with our own minds and bodies but with others in the room.

It was a morning for exploring - exploring our spiritual selves in physical ways. I send special thanks go to our workshop leaders: Jason Mierek, Barbara Jauhola, Sally Babbitt and David Sharpe.

In whatever ways you are exploring and cultivating your spiritual life I wish you well.

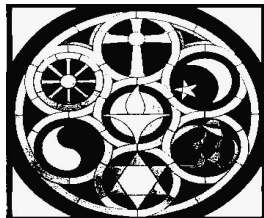

Shared Offering for February: Kiva

The YRUU (Young Religious Unitarian Universalists) are teaming up with the Social Action committee for the February shared offering. Half of the money collected during the weekly offertory will be given to Kiva. Kiva is a micro-lending institution that supports entrepreneurs in the developing world. Through a local, micro-lending bank, entrepreneurs will be able to get small, low interest, Kiva sponsored loans to help start or grow a business. The money may be used for items such as sowing machines, mopeds etc. The YRUU will manage an online account with Kiva that will allow them to decide who we loan money to and keep track of their progress. When the loan(s) are paid back, the YRUU will re-lend the money in a continuous cycle of giving.

Prayer in Response to 2010 Earthquake in Haiti

Spirit of Life; Sacred Web of Life, Death, and Renewal:

Our hearts are open to all who suffer as a result of the earthquake.

We see – on our televisions and computer screens and in our newspapers – the shattered buildings, the hastily erected shanty towns, survivors struggling to find their kin, or just food or water or medicine; so many lives in ruins. We know about the country’s staggering poverty that preceded this most recent disaster; we are keenly aware of our own privilege. In these times we stand confused before the global forces that shape our lives, in awe before the mystery.

We pray for those who work with the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee and other relief organizations, that they may act from ongoing wisdom, and courage, and compassion. We pray for ourselves and other people living in comfort, that our hearts might be touched yet again to generously support human beings facing a terrible tragedy we cannot comprehend, but that they must live through. May we open our hearts and our wallets to them, as they work to rebuild what they can.

Spirit of Life; Web of Life, Death, and Renewal, We pray, too, for our personal struggles, which matter even though others always face greater challenges than ours. There are those among us in this community who are sick, those of us who are grieving, Those of us who have not yet discovered our substantial power to bless the world. We pray for support amidst our struggles, that we might find the courage and grace to move closer to healing and the sacred potential of our lives. We pray for strength, and finally we pray for gratitude: for all that is not lost, for all that can be rebuilt, for our chance to play our part, for the ever-renewing powers of life. And we join in this time of silence, in which we lift up the meditations of our hearts.

Stewardship Matters, Jennifer Greene, Social Action Committee

Yes, our stewardship does matter. As stewards we safeguard that which is in our charge, and we nurture and nourish its health and well being. Our stewardship in the UU church is a collective stewardship, involving our responsibilities to communities outside our congregation. One of the most visible social action activities is our shared offering program. So, to honor and advance our commitments to our collective stewardship, we feature examples of what this stewardship has accomplished through three vignettes.

The first is A Woman's Fund, a local organization with a shelter for victims of domestic violence and rape crisis services. We donated over \$1200 to A Woman's Fund in 2009 which supported a vital life transformation for one woman in crisis and her three children. Here is her story, in brief.

Pauline and Mark had been living together for six years. Then Mark broke Pauline's ribs. Mark apologized, said he would never do it again, and even brought Pauline roses. Pauline, not trusting his unpredictability and still feeling unsafe around him, began to drink more heavily.

Six months later, Pauline was admitted to the hospital for severe injuries inflicted by Mark. A Woman's Fund arranged for Pauline and her children to come to the shelter. Our funds largely supported them at the shelter for several days including their daily needs, extensive counseling, and legal services costing \$130 per day. With the help of A Woman's Fund, Pauline secured an Emergency Order of Protection and possession of the shared residence. Pauline subsequently pursued her own goals, and completed an outpatient substance abuse treatment program. For the first time in years, Pauline now reports feeling safe and can focus her energy on building a future for herself and her children.

Our second vignette comes from PFLAG, Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. We donate to the local chapter of this national organization. PFLAG doesn't have much of an income so the UU gift gave PFLAG some much-valued financial flexibility. Some of the funds were used to co-host a light supper during Dad's Day at the university for LGBT students and their families. This event was especially important as many LGBT students wait until they go to college to come out to their parents. PFLAG looks forward to co-hosting a similar event for Mom's Day weekend in the spring.

Our third vignette comes from the Eastern Illinois Foodbank (EIFB), to which we donated \$1400 in 2009. EIFB accepts donated and discounted food from many sources and distributes it to more than 220 agencies, such as food pantries, soup kitchens and shelters, providing food for 43,000 families a month.

The USDA calculates that it costs a minimum of \$500 a month to feed a family of four. But at EIFB, every dollar donated buys \$10 worth of food. So, our \$1400 donation buys \$14,000 in food, enough to feed a young family of four for 28 months.

These are living, breathing examples of our collective stewardship. They matter to vulnerable people and people in need. And they nurture our own souls and spirits. May we keep on keeping on.

Narrated by Forest Whitaker, CRIPS AND BLOODS: Made in America combines in-depth interviews with current and former gang members, educators, historians, family members and experts with historical and present-day footage to graphically portray the rivalry between African American gangs in South Los Angeles. The 1950s were a period of black prosperity in Los Angeles, fed by the abundance of industry-based jobs. By the end of the decade, however, those industries began to disappear, resulting in high rates of unemployment. Could the factors which converged to create disenfranchised youth on the West Coast be present here in our own community? If it had been a white community, would our government have stepped in to investigate the crisis, counsel the victims, heal the community, and direct funds towards a lasting solution?

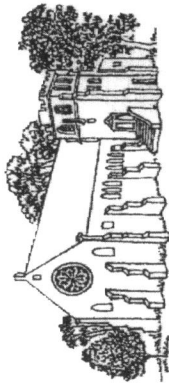
