

Join the UUPMI Education team two Sunday afternoons a month for community-building, facilitated reflection on Mariame Kaba's whip smart book, <u>We Do This 'Till We Free Us: Abolitionist Organizing and Transforming Justice</u>, and real-time actions we can take that bring us closer to a world of reimagined safety and a world without cages and police. Each gathering, we will work our way through the book, two chapters at a time. We will center inside voices with participating prison pen pals and those previously incarcerated.



Our study will give insight into Native American ways and will offer an alternative way of thought and living that embraces the interconnection of all life on Planet Earth. It will show that the Indigenous people have survived and that much of their culture continues to serve them. It offers us an opportunity to view our relationship to all of Earth's inhabitants in a more respectful and sustainable way.

We are reading Robin Wall Kimmerer's <u>Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom</u>, <u>Scientific Knowledge</u>, <u>and the Teachings of Plants</u> (2013, 384 pages). About the book: <u>Braiding Sweetgrass</u>. The book is widely available.



The author is a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation who holds a PHD degree in Botany. She weaves her scientific and Native American knowledge and wisdom with her observations and intuitions into a beautiful poetic story of hope and sustainability.



As part of the "All We Can Save Project," a framework was provided for individuals to meet in community to engage in a deeper dialogue about climate change and discuss solutions. This *All We Can Save* Circle will be based on the book of the same title and structured like the circles from the All We Can Save Project. We will meet for 5 Sunday afternoon sessions in the fall and 5 Sunday afternoon sessions in the spring.



As a covenant for this circle, we will agree to create and maintain a safe discussion space by:

- Honoring confidentiality
- Listening with an open, non-judgmental mindset
- Centering responses on personal experience without judgment of others ad their experiences
- Asking open and honest questions of each other
- Engaging in the reading in advance to focus discussion on shared content


In addition to the Finding Peace in a Frantic World meditations, the class will include partner meditations based on the work of <u>Gregory Kramer</u>.




Popcorn Theology is Back!
